#### SHABBAT AND HOLIDAYS

AISH Australia: An Orthodox outreach organization that welcomes Jews of all backgrounds and caters specifically to students and young professionals. They hold Friday night meals, organize ongoing Jewish learning programs, coordinate opportunities for study, and provide a homey, warm, welcoming environment.

Chabad: An Orthodox organization that welcomes Jews of all backgrounds and caters specifically to students. They hold Friday night, Saturday morning and Holiday services, and have free meals for students. It's an open and welcoming environment, and they organize Jewish learning opportunities as well.

Zooz Minyan: A student-led Modern Orthodox minyan that meets every Friday night and on Holidays. East Melbourne Synagogue: The only synagogue in downtown Melbourne. It's an Orthodox synagogue that's welcoming to Jews of all practice levels, although men and women do sit separately. There are weekly free Friday night dinners that attract lots of students and young professionals.

Home Hospitality: There are many families that love hosting study abroad students in their home for Shabbat and Holiday meals. Contact KAHAL staff to be set up with a local family.

Kehilat Nitzan: A Masorti

(Conservative) congregation that holds Friday night, Saturday morning and Holiday services. They hold occasional community meals and events as well.



#### SHABBAT AND HOLIDAYS

Shira Hadasha: A Modern Orthodox congregation that has Carlebach-style musical services and a vibrant, young congregation. There are several other Orthodox congregations in Melbourne as well.

Temple Beth Israel: A Progressive (Reform) synagogue that holds musical Friday night and Saturday morning services and can help organize home hospitality. There are a few other smaller Progressive congregations in Melbourne as well.

DIY Experience: KAHAL micro-grants are available to any Jewish student studying abroad to help facilitate your Jewish experience. Grants can be used to host your own Shabbat or Holiday meal, organize an event, attend a seminar or conference, or in some cases, as travel subsidies. Grants will be made in USD up to \$250. AIJAC: An organization that advocates the interests of the Australian Jewish community to government, media and other community organizations. They host lectures and events where students are welcome, and it's possible for students to intern or volunteer with AIJAC.
