Robert J. Art is Christian A. Herter Professor of International Relations at Brandeis University. Art is also research associate at the Olin Institute for Strategic Studies at Harvard University, senior fellow at the Security Studies Program at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), and director of the *Seminar 21 Program* at MIT. He received his Ph.D. from Harvard University in 1967 and has received grants from the Council on Foreign Relations, the Guggenheim Foundation, the Ford Foundation, United States Institute of Peace, and the Century Foundation. His research and teaching foci include international

relations, specializing in national security affairs and American foreign policy. In addition, he is a former member of the Secretary of Defense's Long Range Planning Staff and a former Dean of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences at Brandeis. Art is a member of the editorial boards of numerous professional journals. Among his publications are *The TFX Decision: McNamara and the Military*; *Reorganizing America's Defense* (coeditor); *U.S. Foreign Policy: the Search for a New Role* (coeditor); *The United States and Coercive Diplomacy* (coeditor); and *A Grand Strategy for America*.

Daniel Kryder (New School for Social Research, 1995) is associate professor at Brandeis University. Kryder has taught or held fellowships at MIT, Harvard, Johns Hopkins, and Princeton. His research and teaching foci include American political development, the history of race policy and politics, the presidency, and wartime politics. He is the author of *Divided Arsenal: Race and the American State During World War II*, which was named Best Book of 2000 by the Race, Ethnicity, and Politics section of APSA. His current scholarship concerns the relationship between policing and democratization in American history; reparations, war's relationship to domestic reform; and qualitative and historical methods.
