David C. Engerman is Associate Professor of History at Brandeis University, where he has taught since receiving his PhD from the University of California-Berkeley in 1998. His Berkeley dissertation, revised, appeared as *Modernization from the Other Shore: American Intellectuals and the Romance of Russian Development* (Harvard, 2003), won the Stuart Bernath and Akira Iriye Prizes, and was named a Choice Outstanding Academic Title. He edited and introduced a new edition of *The God That Failed* (Columbia, 2001), and co-edited *Staging Growth: Modernization, Development, and the Global Cold War*. Other articles have appeared in *American Historical Review*, *Cahiers du Monde russe*, *Diplomatic History*, *Journal of Cold War Studies*, *Kritika*, *Modern Intellectual History*, and other journals. His current project, "Know Your Enemy: Western Sovietology and the Making of the Cold War," has been supported by fellowships from the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Radcliffe Institute, research grants from the Gilder-Lehrman Institute of American History, the Kennan Institute for Advanced Russian Studies, and the Rockefeller Archive Center. At Brandeis, Engerman is chair of the interdepartmental program in International and Global Studies and a member of the executive committees of the Graduate Program in American History and the History of Ideas Program. He teaches a variety of courses on modern America, including both international history and intellectual history.
