Some ground rules and advice:

1. Please use the assigned translations, as that will make citations and wording consistent and uniform. Texts are available for purchase in the bookstore and on loan in the library. If you have difficulty acquiring a text from either source, please tell me; I often have extra texts or can Xerox for you.

2. Although I do not deduct for absences, I do assign grades for class participation, and absent folk do not participate. I cannot make you talk, so the quality and content of the discussions depend heavily on the attitudes and preparation of you and your associates.

3. Since this class is a SEMINAR, it will seriously disadvantage you to put off the reading. Your verbal contributions will undoubtedly reveal your lack of preparation, and mere physical presence is insufficient. I strongly urge that you do the readings in advance, preferably more than once. You might best read the entire text through, then review the specific assignment just before class; this will allow you time to deliberate upon paper topics and write (and revise) at some leisure. I see little point in buying notes, as these 'aids' are frequently misleading, if not outright wrong. Similarly, secondary scholarship is at your discretion, provided that you document it appropriately, but the time is often better spent in doing your own analysis.

4. According to university statistics, I am not an easy grader; do not expect an A unless you are willing to do exceptional work (by MY standards). Nevertheless, my self-image is as a reasonable and understanding person, so please see me about ANY problems, temporary, permanent, documented, or suspected, concerning USem and your performance therein.

5. Because my agenda for this course is to teach you to have confidence in reading texts and skill in writing thesis-driven papers, **academic integrity, as defined by the Student Handbook, is essential.** Any violations will have serious repercussions.
