## SHABBAT AND HOLIDAYS

Dublin Hebrew Congregation: An Orthodox community which is the center of Dublin's Jewish life. The rabbi is extremely welcoming and hosts large Shabbat dinners in his home every week. He can also help arrange for home hospitality with families in the community for Saturday lunch. The Dublin Jewish Progressive Congregation is very small and holds services on some Shabbats and Holidays. DIY Experience: KAHAL micro-grants are available to any Jewish student studying abroad to help facilitate your Jewish experience. Grants can be used to host your own Shabbat or Holiday meal, organize an event, attend a seminar or conference, or in some cases, as travel subsidies. Grants will be made in USD up to \$250.
