Brandeis National Committee (BNC) provides philanthropic support to Brandeis University, a distinguished liberal arts and research university founded by the American Jewish community. BNC's membership is connected to the university through fundraising and through activities that reflect the values on which the university was founded: academic excellence, social justice, nonsectarianism, and service to the community.

OUR HISTORY

Founded in 1948, Brandeis University is the first Jewish-sponsored, nonsectarian university in the United States. Brandeis reached the pinnacle of American higher education by earning Phi Beta Kappa recognition in 13 years, the youngest university to be honored in this manner since the 18th century. The life of the mind is central to this institution. As a small, vigorous research university, Brandeis combines the education and teaching normally found at small selective colleges with superb facilities and renowned faculty usually found only at the largest research universities.

As one of the youngest and smallest research universities, Brandeis University has a remarkable record of accomplishment. The Rosenstiel Basic Medical Sciences Research Center's interdisciplinary approach to combating diseases has greatly expanded the scope of leukemia research, pinpointed an on/off switch in diphtheria and improved the effectiveness of mammography machines. Research in the Volen Center's Memory and Cognition Lab focuses on how memory and mental processes change across the adult lifespan. The Hadassah-Brandeis Institute develops fresh ways of thinking about Jews and gender worldwide by producing and promoting scholarly research, artistic projects, and public engagement.

Our strong leadership and membership enable us to be a highly successful chapter of the Brandeis National Committee. Currently, our fundraising efforts will go to Engineering education. BNC's new multi-year campaign will raise money for the Brandeis National Committee Professorship in Engineering, supporting a new engineering program that will immerse students in engineering culture and provide them with the essential skills to become engineers and design solutions to complex problems. 27. "13 Drivers' Licenses"

In 2017, 13 Jewish drivers' licenses were discovered in the basement of a local government office in Lichtenfels, Germany, while the town was digitizing archived records. In 1938, Nazis had confiscated the licenses from Jewish residents after the November 9-10 Pogroms, also called Kristallnacht. Eighty years later, following this discovery, the Lichtenfels District Administrator approached a history teacher, who created a research project for his students to learn about the impact of the Holocaust in Lichtenfels. The students investigated the fates of the driver's license holders and ultimately identified descendants. Our speaker recounts her familial journey from the United States to Lichtenfels in November 2018 to reclaim her grandfather's license and a lost chapter of her family history. She explains how a Bavarian town comes to terms with its darkest past. It also is a story about human connection, "doing the right thing," and ultimately the interplay of remembrance, reconciliation, and hope.






