# **Technical Appendices**

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### Technical Appendix A: Methodology

This document describes methodological details for three separate surveys of undergraduate students at three US universities: Brandeis University (Brandeis), Boston College (BC) and Northeastern University (Northeastern). The Brandeis and BC surveys were conducted in the spring semester of 2021, and the Northeastern survey was conducted in the summer of 2021. All three surveys were conducted using similar, but not identical, methodologies.

#### Sampling

All three surveys employed simple random samples of undergraduates ages 18 or older, drawn from each school's list of undergraduates. Students were considered to be in the sample frame if they were enrolled as a full-time undergraduate as of the beginning of the fall semester. At Northeastern students were considered to be part of the sample frame if they were enrolled as full-time undergraduates during the 2021 academic year.

#### **Survey Administration**

The survey was conducted online using the Qualtrics XM platform. Students at each school were sent email invitations and reminders with a unique URL to the survey to their official ".edu" email address. Dates for invitations, reminders, and the closing of the survey period are listed in Table A1. At Brandeis and BC the surveys were administered in two replicates.

Students at Brandeis and BC were informed that upon completion of the survey they could receive a \$10 Amazon.com gift card, or that they could donate \$10 to the Greater Boston Food Bank. Of all respondents to the survey 586 chose the donation option. Due to university policy, respondents at Northeastern were not offered a gift card or donation option.

#### **Dispositions and Response Rates**

Table A2 reports the disposition of respondents and response rates for the surveys by university. Students at Brandeis or Northeastern who had completed at least the "Healthcare Access" section of the survey were considered "partials" if they did not complete the remainder of the survey. Individuals who dropped out of the survey prior to completing the Healthcare Access section were considered "break-offs." However, at BC all respondents who did not complete the entire survey were considered "break offs" because demographic questions necessary for the weighting of BC data were not asked until the end of the survey.

#### Weighting

For each school, weights were calculated to adjust for differences between the characteristics of respondents and known characteristics of the population. Weights were calculated using the "survwgt" command in Stata. Population data were obtained from the auxiliary information on undergraduate email lists provided to SSRI (for Brandeis and Northeastern), or university provided population data (for BC). The weighting factors used for each survey are detailed in Table A3.

Weights were applied to all analyses. Weighted analyses were conducted using the "svy" suite of commands in Stata, and confidence intervals and Chi square tests produced for such analyses account for the sampling characteristics of the data.

#### **Northeastern Questions**

Because the Northeastern survey was conducted after the conclusion of the spring semester the wording of a number of questions was altered to ensure that they referred to the same time period referenced in comparable questions in the Brandeis and BC surveys (e.g. "this semester" was changed to "the spring semester"). However, the timeframe in the questions wording in questions relating to mental health and loneliness could not be easily adjusted. In the BC and Brandeis surveys, the questions refer to the "past week," and surveys were administered while school was still in session. The Northeastern survey administered after the semester was over used "the spring semester" as the timeframe for these questions. Given the dramatic changes in students' situation (including the increasing availability of vaccines) in the intervening period, it was decided that Northeastern students' retrospective assessments of their mental health in the previous semester were not comparable to the contemporaneous assessments provided by Brandeis and BC students. As a result, Northeastern University respondents were excluded from all analyses related to mental health and loneliness.

#### **Construction of Race/Ethnicity Variable**

The survey question that asked about race and ethnicity allowed respondents to select multiple options to best represent how they describe themselves. A small number of respondents chose two or more races. For these respondents, we privileged non-white classifications for analysis purposes. A hierarchy of responses was created to classify people who indicated they had multiple races: Hispanic, Black, Asian, Other Ethnicity, and White. The race a respondent identified with that was first on that list determined how they were categorized for analysis. For example, a respondent who identified as Hispanic and Black was coded as Hispanic. This follows the technique used by the US

Census<sup>3</sup> to ask about Hispanic status separately from race and to consider respondents who indicate that they consider themselves Hispanic to be Hispanic, regardless of other racial definitions.

Our categories were constructed from the following individual response options:

- · Hispanic "Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish origin, such as Mexican, Cuban, Puerto Rican, or Argentinian"
- · Black "Black or African American"
- · Asian "Asian or Asian American"
- · Other Ethnicity "American Indian or Alaskan Native," "Native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islander," "Middle Eastern or North African," any other text response not classifiable into an existing category
- · White "White"

#### **Analysis Paradigm**

Our primary research question for this report involved the relationship between factors associated with in-person or online learning (e.g., in-person/online teaching, socialization, and group activities) and various outcome variables related to pedagogy, campus community, and mental health, among students at these three schools. To explore these relationships we made use of OLS, and ordered logit models that control for student-level demographic variables and school-level differences (through school fixed effects). In some cases, instead of modeling individual outcome variables directly, we instead modeled index variables that aggregated responses from a set of outcome variables that, according to factor analysis, all measured the same underlying construct.

However, because the results of these models are difficult to present intuitively, this report presents unadjusted, weighted, cross-tabs of key independent variables and individual outcome measures. These cross-tabs were only reported when the substantive relationship they described were confirmed as statistically significant in comparable models. Complete results for all cross-tabs discussed in the report, including 95% confidence intervals and design-adjusted chi-square tests can be found in Technical Appendix B. The statistical models confirming these results can be found in Technical Appendix C.
