

Pew has done a great service for the Jewish community

- Methodologically sophisticated survey-based portrait of US Jewry
- Pew 2020 is an extension of their 2013 study
- Includes new questions about identity, engagement with culture, Israel, and Jewish life

Goal is to make the data useful for the philanthropic community

- Selected findings that support or challenge "common wisdom"
- Put the findings in context with other knowledge
- Share lessons we take from the study



Growth and stability since 1970




Intermarriage




Intermarriage and raising Jewish children

More than half of intermarried parents raising children Jewish in some way






Jewish identification (JBR/JNR) and denomination















Birthright participants among Pew respondents ages 18-45
