1. Academic Announcements

Early Dissertation or Master's Thesis/Paper/Capstone Project Completion Tuition Waiver Policy

GSAS would like to remind students who plan to complete an August degree of the early dissertation or master's thesis/paper/capstone project completion tuition waiver policy.

All students must register for the term in which they plan to complete their degree. PhD students should register for CONT 500 (in fall or spring) or CONT 250 (in summer), and master's students should register for CONT 200 (or the department equivalent). If a student completes their dissertation or master's thesis/paper/capstone project within ten (10) business days of the <u>first day of classes for that term</u>, or, in

the summer, within ten (10) business days of Commencement, they will receive a full tuition waiver. Completion is defined as follows:

For a PhD dissertation or a master's thesis: Deposit of the dissertation or thesis to ProQuest ETD. For more information about this process, visit our <u>Thesis and Dissertation Guide</u>.

For a master's paper or capstone project: Acceptance of the paper or project by the program. Students should immediately **notify Abigail Arnold** once the paper or project is accepted.

Students should complete the <u>application to graduate</u> as soon as it is available for the semester.

Embracing Difference: Recognizing Jewish Identity at the Margins in the Effort to Address Racism and Antisemitism Symposium

For this year's DEIS Impact social justice festival, the Brandeis University Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Education and Learning Initiatives, under the direction of Dr. Chip Mc Neal, will host a three-day symposium. With special funding from a generous Brandeis donor, the symposium is centered around Audre Lorde's 'theory of difference' and intersectionality, and will bring together regional and national scholars, practitioners, and the Brandeis community to explore the evolving narrative of "who is Jewish?" – and how those within the greater Jewish diaspora, the Black community, and other marginalized sectors can come together to harness collective agency in the struggle for social justice.

Key themes and inquiry questions:

- Why should antisemitism matter to all of us?
- How might we engage multiple cultural and ethnic groups in addressing antisemitism?
- How might Jews of color better navigate anti-Black racism and antisemitism?
- How might Jewish values support overarching DEI goals and objectives?
- Why is acknowledging our interdependence necessary to transform hegemony and address racism?

The symposium will take place March 25 through 27 in the Hassenfeld Conference Center. The <u>current symposium schedule</u> is now available. The keynote speaker will be Ilana Kaufman, CEO of the <u>Jews of Color Initiative</u>.

- The <u>Dissertation Success Curriculum</u> is designed to provide the skills, strategies, and support that advanced graduate students need to overcome the three biggest obstacles to finishing their dissertation: perfectionism, procrastination, and isolation. The program is built on the assumption that there is only one way to complete a dissertation: WRITE IT!



Brandeis Health Announcements

Covid & Flu vaccines are available for Brandeis graduate and undergraduate students weekly thru the end of April at the health center. Online scheduling is available via the Secure Patient Portal.

The Centers for Disease Control issued new guidelines for managing respiratory illnesses on March 1st. The updated guidance aims to place precautions for SARS-CoV2 (COVID-19) together with other respiratory illnesses such as Influenza and RSV.

- Brandeis has adopted the most recent **CDC guidelines**.
- The **Health Center website** is updated to reflect the new information.
- Brandeis students are no longer required to report COVID positive results to the HC.

Tax Resources for Graduate Students

Tax season is here again, whether we want it to be or not. While Brandeis University cannot offer tax advice, we would like to provide some resources to help students with filing their taxes:

- GSAS Tax FAQs
- Personal Finance for PhDs has several free tax resources for graduate students on their tax center website. Additionally, they offer a tax return preparation workshop, How to Complete Your Grad Student or Postdoc Tax Return (and Understand It, Too!), which was created with funded graduate students in mind. These workshops cost \$34 and are asynchronous, so you can access the module videos at your own pace. There are two versions of this workshop U.S. citizens, permanent residents, or residents for tax purposes and one for non-U.S. residents. Register for a tax workshop here.
- Sprintax Webinars (for international students) through the ISSO Sprintax offers free webinars to help students and scholars learn everything they need to know about U.S. taxes. Topics will include who must file, tax residency, FICA, State returns, implications of misfiling as well as how to use Sprintax to prepare a compliant tax return.
