## Course List for the Ed.M. portion of the Hornstein M.A. / Education Ed.M. dual degree

Eighty credits are required for graduation from the Hornstein MA/Education Ed.M. degree, of which 36 are Ed.M. credits (9 courses), 36 are Hornstein credits, and eight are elective credits.

Students select their Ed.M. courses from the following categories in consultation with the student's Education and Hornstein advisors. The following list of courses are examples of courses available for credit toward the Ed.M. requirements. New courses may be added as they are developed. *Note: The course list below may be subject to change*.
