a message from the Head of the Division

My warmest summer greetings to you all on behalf of the Division of the Humanities! I want to begin by recognizing that the COVID-19 crisis has created profound difficulties for all of us in the Brandeis community, and I have been so impressed and proud as each and every one of you rose up to grapple with the problems you faced as individuals, in your families, and both on and off campus in your communities. Like many other institutions, Brandeis now faces serious challenges to our mission, as well as the challenges of our employees and other stakeholders.

I know, because I have heard it loud and clear from many of you, that our current situation has resulted in

significant stress and insecurity. I can only offer my heartfelt thanks, especially to the Humanities Council, for showing such flexibility as you all considered the needs of everyone under these current circumstances.

I can tell you that over 45 academic associations, several in the Humanities, joined together in a statement (authored by the American Sociological Association) offering important considerations for institutions of higher education regarding temporary adjustments to their review and reappointment processes for tenure line and contingent faculty. Also, many of these same academic associations have made strong statements expressing plans for initiatives to stop systemic racism and support the reinvigorated Black Lives Matter movement. Right on our campus many departments and programs at Brandeis have also posted similar expressions of support. These are all positive signs that we are working together, and that some very real and tangible good will indeed come from these difficult times.

I am very aware of the visible impact the pandemic has had and is having on our research and teaching and the unquantifiable burdens for students (undergraduate and graduate), faculty, and staff

alike. These, of course, include new responsibilities for childcare and other familial needs; new issues for physical and mental health; new questions of financial security; and new concerns for the future. We will get through this together.

I am comforted by the words of one of my favorite Roman poets, Virgil. In his Aeneid, Book 1, line 203, Virgil's mythic hero, Aeneas, rallies his battered and ship-wrecked crew of Trojans, who are fleeing their defeated and burning city of Troy, with these words of encouragement:

Forsan et haec olim meminisse iuvabit.

"Perhaps one day, it will be a pleasure to remember even these things (as in these very tough times)."

We've all just lived through a very tough spring semester and more tough times are no doubt on the way, but many good things have and will also still come out of it all. The amazing and spectacular accomplishments of our students are but one of them. Congratulations to all of you, and it is my pleasure to remember you all here with a list of the prizes and awards given from within the Division of the Humanities.
